Biographical Sketch

Born on October 12, 1909 in Winipeg, the daughter of J. F. B. Livesay and Florence Randal Livesay, Dorothy Livesay came with her family to Ontario as a child.

She received her B. A. from Trinity College, University of Toronto 1931, and from the Sorbonne in 1932, her "diplome d'études supérieures". In 1934 she studied at the School of Social Work at the University of Toronto, and did welfare work in Montreal, New Jersey and Vancouver. On August 14, 1937, Miss Livesay married Duncan Cameron Macnair. They had 2 children Peter and Marcia. In 1956 she received her M.Ed from the University of British Columbia. She was UNESCO Programme Assistant (Education) in Paris, 1958-1960, and in Northern Rhodesia 1960-1963. For 1965-66 she was Lecturer in Creative Writing at U.B.C. and from 1966-68 was writer in Residence at the University of New Brunswick. She is now an Assistant Professor in the Department of English at the University of Alberta, Edmonton.

As a Canadian writer, Miss Livesay is the author of "Signpost",1932; "Day and Night", 1944; "Poems for People", 1947; "Call my People Home", 1950; "Bed", 1967;. She has also been a frequent contributor to CBC "Canadian Short Stories" and talks. Her poetry has won her recognition throughout her career. In 1944 she won the Governor-General's Medal for poetry with "Day and Night", and again won it in 1947 with "Poems for People" She was the Recipient of the Lorne Pierce Gold Medal from the Royal Society of Canada for distinguished service to Canadian Literature in 1947. Provenance of the Collection

These papers were purchased from Miss Dorothy Livesay by Queen's University Archives in January, 1971, with money from the Chancellor Richardson Memorial Fund.

Restrictions

At the request of Seymour Mayne, the letters from him to Dorothy Livesay are closed for fifty years (Until June 20,2025) without the written permission of Mr. Mayne.

At the request of Mr. Leo Kennedy, letters from him to Dorothy Livesay are closed for thirty years (to Jan. 31, 2010) except for his biographer Patricia Morley and his daughter Patricia Ann Kennedy.

Brief Description of the Collection

The papers have been kept in substantially the same files that they were in originally. Dating of letters and notations by the archivist are indicated by square brackets; any other notations were on the papers when they were received.

The collection bears a close relationship to several other sets of papers in Archives. In particular, much correspondence in the Lorne Pierce Papers, in the Alan Crawley Papers, and in the Red Lane papers is clearly related to the same topics and themes as are found in the Livesay papers.

The papers consist of 25 inches of correspondence files, broken into 4 Series. Within the first three series the correspondence is arranged chronologically, and in the final series, chronologically by author. Series 11 contains general correspondence of a literary nature such as arrangements for poetry readings. Because of its large bulk and close ties with the Alan Crawley Papers, material related to Alan Crawley has been made a separate series, number III. Series III contains some original letters from Dorothy Livesay to Alan Crawley. A great deal of this correspondence has been dated by Miss Livesay herself.
